Choosing a Film to Review

When students **write a review**, they should not only retell the story. A good review explains the **plot** clearly but also gives an opinion.

It helps to mention the **setting** and the main character, especially if these details make the film unusual or interesting for the **audience**.

Some films are popular because of their **special effects**, but the acting and the **main message** can be just as important.

If a film is **based on** a book or a true story, students can compare the versions briefly. They should finish by saying whether they would recommend it and why.
